REPORTS

1. Governance Zone
 - (a) Report by the President

Have been concentrating on achieving SUEI Gold, which has been very successful. After seeing two presentations, it seems like we are the best. Also concentrating on Green Impact but its proving harder to get accreditation so we're working on getting there. The Student Satisfaction survey has been very successful and it has been the most accurate to date due to the higher numbers of students who filled it out. The Election handbook is now complete, which you can pick up and if there are any enquiries you can come to our Democracy Co-ordinator. We've been well involved in 'Funding Our Future', which has swept the student movement. There was the 3rd in Hull city centre, which went well and then the 10th in London. We got people involved with making banners and organised the coaches down to London. On the 8th December we had a rally on campus and lobbied as well. We had six conservatives vote against the rise in fees, in which three were under pressure from HUU. We had some problems with getting people on to the coach to come back home but this was out of our hands and we got them back safely in the end. I would like to thank Alice Marshall for all her help in getting those people home. Also a special thank-you to Jonathan Chambers for all his hard work and help. He talked about the Government White paper and we have been able to maintain on a level; wide participation, high graduate employability, student satisfaction and best value for money.

(c) Report by Chair Campaigns and Democracy

2. Community Zone

(a) Report by Vice-President Community

KPI 1. Raise over £25,000 through Rag:

Rag has exceeded all expectations this year, constant activity and a dedicated exec has meant that Rag has been hosting events such as Fashion Shows , World Record Spoon attempts and supporting societies in events such as Protect the Human Week. They have currently raised £10,000 but have events on such as the Kilimanjaro Climb which is projected to raise £22,000 by its self.

KPI 2. Develop a culture of consistent high-quality media, measured by Hullfire being nominated for a Guardian student media award, Jam for an SRA award and HUT having produced two quality programmes:

Hullfire is reporting on a wide range of issues, and has published feedback forms so it can respond to the thoughts of the student body. Despite being nominated Jam missed out on an SRA award this year, but we believe this is unjust due to the high proportion of nominations that we and other radio stations sent culminating in all 14 awards being won by 8 out of a total of 73 stations. It would be far from it for me to band around words such as nepotism but there is a lot of anger in the student radio community about this. HUUTV now as a website, huutv.co.uk which currently has 6 clips on it. They have launched a short film competition and have a detective drama in the pipeline.

KPI 3. Increase student participation in Societies by 10% by Week 12, Semester 2:

1185 members of a society and we are cracking down on unpaid members
94 fully active societies

Drama Soc have been given £800 by the Community zone to bring in local schools to watch their performance of Romeo and Juliet, a fantastic production, which has received nothing but exemplary feedback from the schools.

Dance Soc also have a show on in Asylum tonight at 7 in Asylum, so all go after this

KPI 4. Attend 100% of Ward forums in the Wyke, Northern and University Wards:

Done, issues were raised such as noise and litter, but as a whole we are making a positive impact on the local community. Unfortunately many members of the public have taken the recent events on the news as a representation of the student body as a whole, and with events such as Xmas Lights switch on cancelled because of the weather, it is crucial that we do more community events in the second semester

I have also been contacted by the anti social behaviour team, and as from a meeting we had a couple of weeks ago, we will be working much more closely

KPI 5. Hold at least one major event each semester which engages HUU within the local community attended by at least 100 students:

Xmas Lights was well planned and ready to go – we had back up plans for every eventuality except for extreme snow, which unfortunately hit. I am working very closely with NTA, who are a pro-active group and we hope to do an event in the Spring

KPI 6. Gather and act on feedback, to ensure that the majority of students feel that The Scheme works for them:

It is currently housing week, with boards to fill in, in the foyer, questionnaires to do and the Sabbs and advice centre will be at the lawns, thwaite and needler on Mon, Tues and Thursday night giving advice. We also have a big banner which is up on the overhang of the concourse looking out onto the foyer, and we are part of a working group which aims to radically overhaul and improve The Scheme

KPI 7. Work in conjunction with the police and community groups to decrease student theft by 10% on last year in police statistics:

PC Alastair Kennedy has been transferred, but I have made contact with Nadine who is his replacement. We are also watching very closely to make sure that funding is not cut to the copshop

KPI 8. To collect and distribute best practise by visiting at least five different student unions within the UK:

I was at LSE and Kings this Thursday as part of the NUS campaign and using it as an excuse to network with officers. We have also been contacted by Surrey Union but haven't heard anything back since. In accordance with a project been launched next semester, I hope to travel to Liverpool

3. Education Zone

Report by Vice-President Education

In terms of Course Representation, this semester has been record breaking. We have managed to successfully elect 436 Course Representatives across campus made up of 372 Hull reps and 64 Scarborough reps. This is put quite favourably into context when compared with previous years in terms of volume, but also actually in terms of their strength and their activeness. A total attendance of 261 students has been recorded over all Course Representative training sessions. This includes 218 Representatives who attended the base training sessions and 43 who also attended the optional "Meeting Skills" training session. We produced a series of booklets and other resources for these meetings, which seem to have been well received.

Satisfaction rates from these sessions stand at 97% of attendees being Satisfied or Very Satisfied with the session. This is an increase on last year's score of 90%. Lee Fallin should receive special thanks for all his work in this

aspect. He has been described as the Energizer Bunny of training, and thoroughly deserved his employee of the month accolade.

Another example of the activeness of this Representation System is from our first HUU Academic Council, 121 Course Reps were present, a quite impressive figure for a system that has previously continually been questioned as to its significance. A vast range of issues were discussed, predominantly on a number of projects that I'm working on this year, which I was eager to gain input on, but also, Course Reps had the freedom and opportunity to raise individual issues that their Course or Department was facing. This meeting was also our opportunity to elect Faculty Representatives. We managed to get 20 Faculty Reps elected, a significant improvement from nothing in place at all last year.

The minutes of Academic Council were submitted to the University Learning and Teaching Committee. The University are seemingly very grateful that there is now a process of dialogue between students, and the University Senior Management. The issues raised were recommended to be disseminated to Staff/Student Committees and it will also have a large input to the University's Learning and Teaching Strategic Plan, which is due for renewal this year...

Whilst we have had lots of big wins in various aspects, we've also experienced a few flops along the way. Our Course Rep social for example, attracted just 7 students, the weather and time of year being a key factor. Also, the snow recently has had a serious effect on our timetabling for a second academic council and also, it's been a nightmare ordering our course rep hoodies and we may now be facing a Liberal Democrat style broken pledge of having promised them to arrive before Christmas, we are now unsure as to whether this is still possible. We've done all we can to try and make sure they are here ASAP, but we are victim of the elements! Aside from Course Reps, but still relevant, we have now finalised the majority of arrangements for our HUU Academic Conference taking place on February the 17th in Hull and the 18th in Scarborough. The theme of the events will be *"The future of Higher Education and the growing importance of the University of Hull's ability to engage with students in a time of change..."*

I hope it will be quite an engaging opportunity for students to get involved with. We already have commitment from various important figures in attendance. The Vice Chancellor, Pro Vice Chancellor L+T, University Librarian, Hull North's MP, an NUS Representative, a QAA Representative and potentially some other people that we are working hard to get. I hope you guys, as councillors can all attend and have some significant input to the day.

As you can probably tell, the idea of working collaboratively with the University and engaging students in the process of change is something I believe quite passionately about.

I'm working with The University on a number of projects. Most noteworthy, is the Library campaign that we are formulating this year. The University Librarian is acting as a mentor to myself, Aidan and Lee and helping us to

construct our argument for a redeveloped library through a structured, rational way and through the means of a well evidence paper. I have requested to do a presentation on the 17th of January at the University Learning and Teaching Conference; the paper is entitled HUU's Vision For a Future of The Brynmor Jones Library which includes a high level of ICT access. The University have accepted, and this will hopefully have a significant input to the University's L+T Strategy. This will also be the opportunity for us to unveil our Video campaign. This is basically a montage of all the stuff we've done, such as our visit to Sheffield and our Ideas Cafe and will hopefully raise awareness of the current issues students face with the Library and will recommend how they might be solved. Otherwise, Lee and I, and the Education Zone are taking on lots of other projects. I have worked with my Chair of Mature students and Chair of Part-Time students and we are looking at organising an event for Mature and Part-Time students. I am also part of a working group that is re-writing a code of practice on Representation and also on Assessment and Feedback.

4. Scarborough Campus

Report form VP Scarborough

The Scarborough Operational plan for 2010/11 has fallen behind a little due to issues of a personal nature which are affecting the VP Scarborough. Moreover, due to adverse weather conditions the VP Scarborough was isolated in his home town due to snow as the Rail network was not operational in their area and the VP Scarborough does not drive. Thanked Sam Hargreaves for the help and support on the trip to London. Also thanked all the campus officers for their hard work.

KPI 11. The Scarborough Zone will be responsible for monitoring expenditure against the agreed Scarborough Budget:
The budget is currently ok with regards expenditure. However, the NUS Demonstrations and lobbying have cost Scarborough approximately £2400 of which the NUS will be giving the Union back a certain percentage but the amount is yet to be confirmed. However, apart from that everything is ok.

KPI 12. Increase in membership participation by 20% in sports clubs and societies:

Sports – there has been an increase in unpaid membership. However, society's participation has fallen a little. At refreshers there is an aim to try and promote sports and societies more by giving them a stall. A lot of the issues surrounding the drop in numbers is because badminton and ladies football is no longer in existence and there is a feeling that they don't get enough incentives from the Union.

Societies – we have 12 members for pool 5 members for basement radio and 2 members for lucky strike. Those are paid members. There are other societies such as the Christian Union and SHRUBS but they have no paid members as they do not use Union as it is felt we don't give enough back. In addition to this, in order to increase participation in sports, a sports development paper is been created in partnership with the University and the Union. Unfortunately, this will be later than initially expected. However, a united front provide Scarborough with a good case to ensure sports development is dealt with on the campus.

KPI 13: Run two Campaigns specific to Scarborough Campus in Week 6, Semester 1 and week 7 & 8 in Semester 2.

There has been one large campaign on 'funding our future', which has been targeted at our local MP, Robert Goodwill. This has included students protesting outside the University when the MP came to open the new facilities. This has been a continuation of events driven by the Campaigns Officer, the Executive and VP Scarborough.

There have also been two small campaigns. The first one was that sauce in the cafeteria was too expensive. Students were asked to write down their thoughts. This was presented to the Catering Manager who listened and has now started operating a sauce bottle system. In addition, the Community Officer has launched a campaign for a student living room and basic heating facilities. This has been started with a petition and will be addressed in the new year.

KPI 14. 20% increase in Chlamydia testing on last year's SHAG week total: Unfortunately, due to the absence of the Welfare Officer SHAG week was cancelled. The Welfare Officer has since resigned due to health reasons. Madonna Masuka has been co-opted onto the Executive and will seek to run SHAG week in semester two with the aid of the VP Welfare.

5. Sport Zone **Report by Vice-President Sport**

Semester One:

Memberships currently stand at 1951. 49 more members needed to reach KPI for the academic year.

BUCS update – Men's Badminton 1st Team, Ladies Hockey 1st Team, and Men's Rugby Union 1st Team still unbeaten in leagues, with Men's Rugby Union 1st Team still in the cup as well.

Safety equipment ordered for various clubs – mainly matting at the SFC, as this has been an issue needing to be addressed for the past couple of years.

Events:

Super Teams – The second weekend of the year was too soon to grab the attention of the new students at The Lawns, and with the Hull weather also a

deciding factor, we unfortunately had to postpone the event in the days leading up to the event. There are plans to re-arrange this for the second semester.

Naked Calendar – As always it was a success, with more than 25 teams turning out to raise money for the Athletic Union. The calendars will be arriving this week, so if you would like to purchase one for just £5 then please come into the office and enquire.

AU Ball – 230 members filled out Staff House for an entertaining night, where we raised over £400 in raffle money. The proceeds from this usually go to the Athletic Union, but with the event being organised so well, we felt we were in a position to donate the money to charity.

Semester Two:

Pedestrian crossing – I've spoken to the local Casualty Reduction Officers about the possibility of a pedestrian crossing being inserted on Inglemire Lane where the Sports and Fitness Centre crosses over to the sports pitches. I feel that this is of vital importance as it can be a very dangerous road to cross. This not only affects our students, as every night we have clubs in the local community using our facilities, and I feel this is something that we need to act on, as it could potentially save lives.

Continue hard work in redeveloping the Table Tennis, Skydiving and Sailing clubs. Posters to be put up in the Union over Christmas break to advertise trial sessions for these new clubs after the exam period. I'm also looking into attracting interest for other clubs, including Cycling, Futsal, and Pool/Snooker, as I try to have 50 clubs registered with the Athletic Union by the year end. This would be a fantastic achievement, and will hopefully bring in more members than we have ever had before.

Events planned:

Dodge ball competition – looking to be taking place in Asylum in February
Super Teams – will be on the Asylum pitches during an Open Day or Applicant Day in March, and will be a free-to-enter competition.

AU Trophy Presentation – Will be at the end of April, with a couple of changes being planned for a bigger occasion than the traditional Staff House meal

Varsity – Plans are being made to bring Varsity back to the students of Hull University. Looking at a weekend tournament towards the end of February, with York looking to host and accommodate, and YSJ and Leeds Trinity making up the other teams. There is a meeting about this taking place after the BUCS Regional Meeting in Leeds on Thursday.

Tour – So far 530 members of the Athletic Union have signed up to travel with us to Lloret de Mar. The deadline has been pushed back to Christmas Eve in an attempt to give members more time to source the funds to pay the deposit.

6. Welfare Zone

Report by Vice-President Welfare

KPI 1. Ensure welfare budgets are not exceeded:
Up to date Good!

KPI 2. Welfare zone volunteer officers – 100% of officers doing 100+ hours of volunteering in 10/11 and receiving recognition through the 'V' scheme: All forms have been sent off, All volunteers were asked to also register online and begin recording hours volunteering!

KPI 3. Advice Centre – 80% of all clients satisfied with the help given – (minimum of 100 questionnaires completed):
Questionnaires are still being given out

KPI 4. A 20% increase in participants of Chlamydia testing during SHAG week:
Week 10 semester 1 – N/A

KPI 5. A decrease reported in positive Chlamydia tests between weeks 1 and 10 semester 2 compared with the same period in semester 1:
Week 10 semester 1 . To capture as many individuals as possible this isn't going to happen. We'd prefer to incorporate a large number of individuals rather than focusing just on students.

KPI 7. To strive to provide free pregnancy tests to students at the University during the 2010 – 2011 academic year, with 50% of those who request will receive a test:
Training for staff happened in October – Some pregnancy tests are now available in the Advice Centre, however we're currently not being supplied them by the NHS. We will be reviewing how many people are asking for them!

Since Week 4, The Welfare Zone has:

Ran a Breast Cancer Awareness Day with Breast Cancer Care on October 21st 2010

Produced in conjunction with VP Community a questionnaire for the Scheme which is currently being used and will continue to be used up until the Housing fair in January!

Is attempting to recruit mystery shoppers to look at the Landlords on the scheme and how they are abiding by the rules (Official commencement during housing week)

Took 5 people including myself down to conifer house to attend pregnancy test training

Took part in the Red Brick Ideas cafe on 27th October

Mental Health Day 2nd November – Over 250 people took part in the day event which was a big success for mental health! The night was not as popular but was enjoyed by everyone that attended.

Took part in interviews to recruit new member of staff

National Demo on 10th November

Finance Week and Free Your Money day – Where the Friday saw over 400 people come through the Asylum doors to learn budgeting skills and get freebies! Even though the Union seemed to be really quiet during the week – We did have a good amount of time engaging with members especially on the Thursday playing Deal or No Deal.

I chaired the first Committee meeting for the Advice centre management team and attended some volunteer training.

SHAG week - Cucumber challenge – Had 35 participants students and staff, 9 Chlamydia tests during the 2 hour slot and then carried on at the Lawns! With a further 30 tests carried out between 5.30m and 7pm. Due to snow days it has now been necessary to rearrange the rest of the planned activities.

Black Students Committee – Black History Month went well. Making a film at the moment with information from the seminars titled ‘Relevance of racial stereotyping’. This will be the next public awareness campaign.

Attended Refugee Council and Student Conference

Disabled Students Committee – Campaign ideas for improvement from last year of the wheelchair user’s campaign. It will be used to find out more about accessibility throughout campus, and views and attitudes towards physically disabled students. To take place during semester 2, with volunteers being recruited now. LINKS are able to borrow a wheelchair for the day to help with this.

Mental health day stall for the disabled students committee; we had some good comments and a few people interested. Our fund raising officer is trying to raise funds at the moment with Aussie Beach trying to get to Alton Towers. Designed posters for disabled doors on the A3 building and SU, but people don’t seem to be bothered, still trying to stop people from going through the disabled door, but lots go through it.

LGBT Committee – The LGBT committee had met with members and a successful kid’s tea-party was organised with around 20 people in attendance. A coffee morning social is being planned along with a trip to club ‘Fuel’ in the city.

Women’s Committee – Attended an NUS training conference with other members of the committee en tripled to 15, instead of 5 from last year’s figures. Busy two weeks, enjoyed the London protests. Attended Lecture ran by the Humberside historical society about the Suffragette movement, so that should be good.

Women’s Week - Stall in the HUU and having a photogram of a feminist we are trying to dispel the rumours that all feminists look a certain way, trying to rebrand. Went to Hull Truck for the Vagina Monologues. Muslim Women’s Association held a stall on the Thursday. The film society are putting on a film about Vera Drake which is about back street abortionists. History of Women’s liberation. Irradiate Violence against Women’s – paint hands and put on paper “these hands not for hurting”

LINKS – LINKS had been busy covering Hull Fair and Asylum on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday nights. Courses on First Aid had been attended and the first social for the semester had also taken place. 5 original members went on advanced training – additional skills including the defibulator with 4 more to be assessed to use de fib. White t shirt social last week not many Fresher's. We have interviewed 21 people, everyone passed just waiting for the CRB checks to come back then we can start training hopefully by next weekend so we will have 21 new first aiders. Made PDP's for all members so they can reflect write down their experiences, they are all ready. HUU in city couple of us went along. Good attendance for Thursday training. 11 Fully qualified members. 18 to do the first aid course then first aid at work so from December we should have 18 new First Aiders. Stall at the Newlands Christmas lights. Continued weekly Thursday training and new uniform ordered.

Nightline – 2nd November - Mental Health Day stall. Since the last meeting finalised which trainees becoming members, so we have 11 new members – observations over 3 shifts to make sure they have all the information, good new people. We also took place in mental health day, we gave out fruit and condoms busy and lots asking about nightline, a few signed up for next training which isn't until February. We will be taking part in Shag week and Free your money day, to raise awareness of Nightline.

Question- About the Pregnancy testing training and how simply handing out pregnancy tests isn't very effective in actually raising issues around unprotected sex. VP Welfare explained that they had been given good training on how to talk to those who want a pregnancy test and give them valuable advice.
